AAAL MINOR REQUIREMENTS

The African and African American Literature Minor is a six-course (18-credit hour) program of study that can be combined with any undergraduate major at WCU.

TWO REQUIRED COURSES, FOUR ELECTIVES

Students begin the minor by completing two required survey courses—one in African Literature (CLS 203 or CLS 351) and one in African American Literature (LIT 202 or LIT 203)—and then choose from a variety of elective classes that include:

- » Harlem Renaissance
- » African American Novel
- » African American Film
- » Urban Literature
- » African American Rhetorics
- » Frederick Douglass
- » Martin Luther King
- » Black Women Writers
- » Special-Topics Research Seminars (ENG/CLS 400)

The English Department offers at least five AAAL Minor-affiliated courses each semester, allowing you flexibility in your choice of classes and enabling you to complete the minor in a relatively short amount of time.





They'll help you develop a sophisticated critical vocabulary for responding to the literature and interpreting it in its theoretical, cultural, historical, and political contexts.
