# PASSHE: Summer in Norway

The PASSHE Summer Honors Trip is an educational experience, which takes place each year to give two honors

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students from each state university the opportunity to study special topics courses abroad while earning college credit and forging new relationships. This year's program focuses on Norway, specifically the nation's leading initiatives of environmental sustainability and the Nobel Peace Prize. We will spend the first week of this experience studying here at West Chester University with two students from each of the PASSHE schools, as well as faculty members Dr. Kevin Dean, Dr. Charles Hardy, and Dr. Denise Polk. During the second week, we will travel to Norway, staying at the American College of Norway, and visiting the cities of Moss and Oslo. The last few days of the trip will be spent on the western coast and the town of Stavanger. In addition to educational initiatives while in Norway, we will also be experiencing some of the nation's culture and history, including visiting one of the world's top natural wonders, Pulpit Rock!

The first special topics course we will be taking is HON 355 Norway's Nobel Idea for Promoting Peace and Developing Leaders. In this course we will be studying the various aspects that go into choosing candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize, since the Nobel Peace Institute is located in Norway. As a PASSHE system, our end goal is for all of the students on the trip to complete research and come together to choose one individual to nominate for the Nobel Peace Prize! The second class is HON 355 Environmental Stewardship Challenges of the Twenty-First Century. In this course we will have the opportunity to partner with the environmental protection agency in Norway, one of the leading countries in conservation initiatives, to conduct research on environmental systems.

We are both very excited to not only learn more about the education and culture of Norway, but also to meet other honors students throughout PASSHE schools. These experiences combined will expand our world- view and allow us to be more engaged in our global community.

## Service Trip to North Carolina

During the last week of winter break, a group of seven West Chester University Students embarked on an eight-hour journey with Dr. Helion, Dr. Chuck Shorten, and Mr. Rick Stevenson down to Swan Quarter, North Carolina. We were joined by seven other students and faculty from East Stroudsburg and Rowan Universities. Partnered with the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), we spent a week repairing and rebuilding homes horribly damaged by various hurricanes and tornados. The trip was nothing short of rewarding and eye opening.

We had the opportunity on multiple occasions to speak with the property owners and hear first hand accounts of how the storms had affected and still continually impact their lives. One woman was trapped inside her home, which was picked up off of its foundation and moved five feet away from its original location. The floorboards were completely ripped up, walls caved in, windows shattered, and her roof was unsalvageable. Unfortunately, it was not possible to repair her home due to the monstrous amounts of damage that occurred, but UMCOR received enough funding and volunteers to build a new home for her on her same property. With basic structure constructed from a previous crew, our team worked together to make advancements on the house in areas such as siding, plumbing, roofing, and construction of a deck. The homeowner's uplifting attitude was very inspiring and helped make the long, cold days worthwhile. Our team as a whole was very touched not only by the appreciation exhibited by those we helped, but by the community members in general.

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The atmosphere in this county with a population of less than 500 was so unlike anything I have experienced before, paralleling that of an old time movie, where neighbors wholeheartedly cared for one another, and genuine friendliness was the standard rather than the exception. The trip will be offered again next winter, and will be the 10th year Dr. Helion has so kindly extended the invitation to his students. I would recommend this trip to anyone who truly hopes to make a difference in the lives of others, as this experience has opened my heart and eyes in ways I truly did not expect. ~ Julianna Mann

### Alumni Spotlight: Daniel VanHassent

Daniel graduated from West Chester University and the West Chester University Honors College in May 2014 with a Bachelor of Arts in History and Secondary Education. While attending West Chester University, Daniel was very involved in different organizations on campus. He participated in Marching Band, University Ambassadors, the Friars' Society, and of course, the Honors Student Association. In addition, he worked on campus as a Leadership Consultant in the Division of Student Affairs.

After graduation, Daniel ended up first working as a Per Diem Substitute Teacher (per day) for the Chester Country Intermediate Unit (CCIU). Soon after, West Chester B. Reed Henderson High School offered Daniel to serve as a Long-Term Substitute Teacher for September and October teaching AP Psychology and African-Asian Cultures. Daniel also devoted his time working for the Downingtown West High School Marching Band. "On top of teaching, grading, and lesson planning at Henderson High School, I would then travel to Downingtown West High School almost every day from early August to mid-November," Daniel recalls. After he finished up his time at Henderson, Daniel returned to working as a Per Diem Substitute Teacher with the CCIU and with Substitute Teacher Services.

Daniel reached stability when North Penn High School in Lansdale, PA offered employment as a Permanent Per Diem Substitute Teacher, or building substitute. He arrives to North Penn every day and is placed in any classroom as needed. He keeps Dr. Dean's expression, "Be Flexible!" as his mantra, as he can be placed in any classroom even though he was hired specifically for Social Studies. Daniel sums up his transition, "my second day on the job, I was substitute for an Aquatics teacher... My transition to adult life has come with many changes and new experiences so far!"

As for Honors, Daniel took advantage of many opportunities and gained a few lifelong skills. He held four leadership positions in HSA during his college career.

Daniel also "caught the travel bug" while in Honors. He went on every Winter Break service trip with Dr. Helion and traveled to South Africa in 2012 and Russia in 2013. He can still relate these eye-opening experiences to his life today. "As a Social Studies teacher, I am able to use these experiences in my classroom when teaching about the world around us." Four lifelong skills Daniel took away from honors were leadership, organization, time management and flexibility. These skills have helped him in school and in his career. Daniel demonstrates leadership in his classroom and also when he worked with Downingtown West High School's Marching Band; "A key component of leadership is thinking about what is best for those you are leading." He learned to be organized and how to tackle his busy schedule with classwork and extra curricular activities. Now, he utilizes his time management skills in his everyday life. As for flexibility, Daniel learned nothing goes as planned. Whether it was course work or something that came up in one of his leadership roles at West Chester, he grasped the idea to "go with the flow" and embraces it in his daily work.
